Vocational Education Development in Timor-Leste



The Xanana Vocational Education Trust was established in July 2005 to help Timor-Leste develop a self sustaining vocational education system which will assist it to rebuild through skill based economic activity.

The Trust's mission is to raise funds for distribution to approved organisations or individuals in Timor-Leste for the purpose of developing a vocational education system contributing to productive employment outcomes. These funds will be distributed according to agreed criteria including openness, equity and results achieved.

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Building a New Future for Timor-Leste

The Trust has a comprehensive plan for assisting with the development of a vocational education system in Timor-Leste.

One aspect of the plan is to offer Vocational Training Assistance Grants to East Timorese vocational education providers. The grants enable training providers to give young people some of the practical skills needed to have an impact in the workforce. Some existing programs already underway are:

The East Timor Development Agency ETDA has conducted a "Fundamental Office Skills" course funded by the Trust for unemployed young people. Before the first stage was completed ETDA reported, as part of their regular required feedback to the Trust, that six of the initial 26 participants already had full time jobs. Apart from two who were displaced in Refugee camps, the others were completing their required work experience and their future job prospects were much enhanced. The Trust places great emphasis on job development, not simply training for the sake of training.

Dili Institute of Technology (DIT) has developed a new Certificate 2 course in basic Automotive Maintenance. The course is principally for unemployed young people. Practical work experience is an important part of the course. The course includes a module to help gain employment or possibly start their own micro business.

Don Bosco Agricultural School at Fuiloro, over 200km from Dili, fills a vital role in the training of young people in the Los Palos area which is at the eastern end of the country and quite remote from Dili. The Trust is pleased to be helping Don Bosco develop training in horticulture for young people using newer more productive techniques not common in a largely subsistence agricultural community. ☼
